### **NEW HIRE**

Mayor Bray stated that he wanted to congratulate new hire Donald Green, who will be joining our Public Works Department. Councilman Fritzingler welcomed Mr. Green as well, adding that he is excited to have him join the Raritan Borough family and is looking forward to having him work with us for a long time. Councilwoman Melitsky stated that as DPW's liaison, she is really looking forward to working with Mr. Green.

### **PRESENTATION**

Chris Edwards, President/CEO of Somerset County Business Partnership, delivered a prepared presentation on two programs, "Why Somerset NJ" and "Sip and See Somerset", that will benefit Raritan Borough.

### **PUBLIC COMMENT**

Mayor Bray opened Public Comment for any member of the Public wishing to be heard.

Joseph Kempe, 114 Sherman Ave.: Mr. Kempe stated that his taxes went up by 10% but he doesn't see an increase in his services.

Anthony DeCicco, Anderson Street: Mr. DeCicco stated he didn't want to stay until the end of the meeting and asked if there would be any discussion on Resolution No. 2022-08-126, Mayor Bray stated that he didn't anticipate any discussion on that Resolution. Mr. DeCicco then extended his courtesy to Borough Administrator/Clerk Colvin for helping him with this liquor license transfer.

Joe DeVito, 710 Columbus Ave: Mr. DeVito stated that he wanted to acknowledge that he did receive the letter from the attorney, and he appreciates the work that the Borough is planning, one of the issues he had last time was that it was going to be a short term solution on a storm drain issue that is effecting Riverside and Columbus. Mr. DeVito stated that he recently sent an email to Council showing his ideas for short-term solutions for this issue and he is happy that the Borough is coming up with a long-term solution but they need a short-term solution to help them currently. Mr. DeVito, along with his neighbors, believe the best short-term solution is the vacant lot near Riverside and Columbus, adding that the long-term engineering plans keep creeping further away and they need something sooner until the engineering plan can be executed. Mayor Bray confirmed that he did receive and read Mr. DeVito's email, and he believes that Borough Engineer Schrek needs to respond since it is his field of expertise. Mr. DeVito said he would like a timeline for the long-term solution and would like to see if a short-term solution can be put into place in the meantime.

Neither seeing nor hearing any member of the Public, Mayor Bray closed Public Comment.

1. Splash Park (PG)

Councilman Giraldi stated that he would like to carry this to the next Council Meeting since Borough Engineer Schrek could not attend this meeting.

**NEW BUSINESS**

1. Engineer's Report (SS)

Mayor Bray stated that since our Borough Engineer Schrek is not in attendance tonight, they will table this until the September meeting.

2. Frosty Frolic 5K (JH)

Councilwoman Hutzler stated that Raritan Recreation Department will be holding its First Annual Frosty Frolic 5K run on December 3, 2022 at 9 a.m., they will be using the same course as the Manila Madness run. Councilwoman Hutzler stated that a motion is needed to approve the event and for the related road closures. Councilwoman Hutzler added that the needed departments have been contacted regarding the event and agreed to provide the requested assistance, which include: the Police Department, OEM and DPW.

Councilman Orozco stated that he would like to know what the business owners on the course route think about the run, and he also confirmed that the 5K was not being done for a charity. Mayor Bray then asked Councilwoman Hutzler for which roads would need to be closed, to see which businesses would be impacted. Mayor Bray stated that they will hold off on the motion until next meeting after the affected businesses have been talked to and made aware of the event.

3. Block Party – Brentwood Road (EC)

Borough Administrator/Clerk Colvin stated that residents of Brentwood Road sent in an application for a block party for Saturday, October 1, 2022, with a rain date of October 15, 2022, from 2 p.m. to 8 p.m. Borough Administrator/Clerk Colvin stated that the Police Department and Public Works have both looked at the application and have no issues with it, a motion to close the road intersecting at Colby is needed.

4. Regional Farmers Market (EC)

Borough Administrator/Clerk Colvin stated that Duke Farms reached out, they hold their Regional Farmers Market on Sundays but they will not have enough parking to allow for both the farmers market and Duke Farms to be open at the same time, so Duke Farms is proposing that they hold a farmers market here in Raritan, possibly on the stretch of Orlando Drive by the former golf range. Borough Administrator/Clerk Colvin added that Somerset County would be involved as well, stating that Duke Farms is just looking to see if Raritan Borough would be okay with them exploring the possibility of holding the farmers market here in town. Council verbally agreed that a farmers market would be a great opportunity for Raritan.

5. Basilone Boulevard (PO)

Councilman Orozco stated that he received a request from Adam Armahizer, a local resident, to symbolically rename Somerset Street to Basilone Boulevard, he loved the idea and talked to County Commissioner Melanie Morano about it, who then brought it before the Commissioner Board, where it received unanimous support and was approved. Councilman Orozco stated that Somerset Street will be symbolically renamed Basilone Boulevard between Thompson Street and First Avenue, details on the sign unveiling will be coming soon, adding that he wanted to thank the County Commissioners and Commissioner Morano for bringing this to fruition and Mr. Armahizer for bringing the idea to his attention. Councilman Orozco stated that the County Commissioners would like Raritan Borough Council's blessing to move forward with the symbolic naming and signage.

6. **Street Cleaning (PO)**  
Councilman Orozco stated he would like to see Public Works have a set schedule for the street sweeper, allowing Council to put alternate parking into effect on days when the street sweeper is in use, that way the street can be cleaned fully all the way up to the curbs and not be swerving around parked cars.  
Councilwoman Melitsky stated that she had talked to the Superintendent of Public Works a while back about this, he had stated that there is no set schedule for the street cleaning, they use it when they have time available. Mayor Bray stated that a set schedule would be good, and asked Councilman Orozco if he would like to share our street sweeper with other towns when not in use once we have a set schedule. A brief discussion between council took place about alternate street parking, ending in Mayor Bray asking DPW liaison, Councilwoman Hutzler, to reach out to DPW Superintendent, Vince LoMedico, for a more set street sweeping schedule.
7. **Environmental Commission Member (ZB)**  
Mayor Bray stated that Heath Hoffmeister has volunteered to be the newest member of the Environmental Commission, he then stated that Mr. Hoffmeister is officially being appointed to the Environmental Commission.
8. **Middle Valley Partners (ZB)**  
Mayor Bray stated that Seth Tifton is here from Middle Valley Partners to deliver a prepared presentation regarding an update on the Medical Marijuana Treatment project and an updated timeline – which is required by the State. Mr. Tipton said he plans for the currently approved operation to be open for business by the end of November. Middle Valley Partners, he said, is requesting Council approval for the company to apply to the State to have an adult use operation, in addition to the already approved medicinal. The adult use sales would take place at the same location and medicinal sales would receive priority.

**COMMITTEE AND LIAISON REPORTS**

Councilman Giraldi – Councilman Giraldi reported that the Raritan Police Department assisted with traffic control and crowd control at the Discovering Raritan event, the event was a tremendous success, and there were no incidents reported. Councilman Giraldi stated that the Police Department also participated in the Fourth of July Holiday DWI enforcement campaign.

Councilman Giraldi reported that construction on Bell Avenue, between Congress Street and Route 202, is scheduled to start on August 15, 2022, the project is likely to run for approximately three weeks, expect road closures in the area.

Councilman Orozco – Councilman Orozco reported that the EDC is currently meeting downstairs. Councilman Orozco welcomed Mr. Hoffmeister to the Environmental Commission, adding that they will have their meeting on Thursday at 7:00pm. Councilman Orozco announced that they are presenting a draft of the Storm Water Ordinance.

Councilman Fritzinger – Councilman Fritzinger reported that for the period of June 22, 2022, through July 12, 2022, the Building Department issued 14 building permits, 19 plumbing, 22 electrical, three fire, totaling in 59 total permits, total fees collected was \$20,413.00 coming to the Borough. Councilman Fritzinger reported that for the period of July 25, 2022, through August 12, 2022, the Building Department issued five building permits, 9 plumbing permits, 10 electrical, 7 fire, totaling in 31 permits with a total of \$11,142.00 in fees to the Borough.

Councilman Fritzinger stated that for the Historical and Cultural Committee they don't have a meeting this month, adding that they had a small group out at the Discovering Raritan event, and he encouraged everyone to take a look at the newly wrapped benches along Somerset Street, the artists put a lot of time and effort into the renditions. Councilman Fritzinger stated that Historical and Cultural Committee's next meeting will be September 21, 2022, at Borough Hall at 7 p.m.

Council President Cara – Council President Cara reported that at the last Planning Board meeting, there were three resolutions passed, all for Jansen Pharmaceuticals for minor improvements to three buildings on their property, there were three preliminary approvals for the Delta Gas Station to turn the garage into a little convenience store, there are two preliminary approvals for subdivisions, one off of Vones Lane and the other off Quick Avenue, there were also two discussions about redevelopment and one discussion about parking that was time committing, so that will be continued at the next meeting, adding that the redevelopment discussions were about the Raritan Mall off of 206 and LaGrange Street, which was a former factory. Council President Cara stated that the next Planning Board meeting will be held August 24, 2022, at 6:30p.m., here at Borough Hall in the Courtroom.

Council President Cara stated that the Economic Development Committee's Third Annual Discovering Raritan event took place July 30, 2022 and was a very successful event for our businesses and Raritan welcomed more than 5,000 people, adding that according to Connection Magazine they will now be featuring a Raritan business page thanks to the EDC, so far nine businesses in Raritan will have an advertisement featured in the magazine. Council President Cara stated that the EDC would like to welcome the following businesses to town, the Royal Barber Shop, located in the Raritan Mall, Santa's Cabinetry, located right here by the Municipal Building, Belladonna's Boutique Unique and Chic, Puff City on 202, and Always Affordable Moving and Storage, adding that the EDC is still looking for new members, if you would like to join, you can email [makeraritan yours@gmail.com](mailto:makeraritan yours@gmail.com) for more information.

Councilwoman Melitsky – Councilwoman Melitsky stated for the Board of Health in the month of July, there were four marriage licenses issued, adding that there is no charge for them, 11 marriage certified copies were issued, resulting in \$137.00 collected, and 220 death certified copies were issued, for a total of \$854.00. Councilwoman Melitsky reported for Property Maintenance, during the time period of July 11, 2022 to August 15, 2022, there were 52 inspections and 19 violations were issued.

Councilwoman Melitsky reported that for Public Works, as always, they're busy, and since the last council meeting, the department has routinely patched potholes as needed, chip brushed throughout the town, maintained tractors and lawn equipment, marked the pavement for parking at the firehouse, street hydrants and the Police Department, they've prepared Belgium Block curving on Vanderveer Road, assisted in the Discovering Raritan event, manned the Saturday grass drop-off, they lined the fields for kickball for recreation, they repaired toilets in the public restrooms at the Washington School fields and they've cut down and removed a tree on Reimer along with general day-to-day

responsibilities. Councilwoman Melitsky added that she believes DPW saves the Borough a lot of money because they do a lot of in-house repairs, which is great.

Councilwoman Hutzler – Councilwoman Hutzler reported that for Recreation, summer camp ended this past Friday, August 12, 2022, the average number of campers this year was 14 a week, versus 8 a week last year, the Frelinghuysen pool will be closing this Friday, August 19, 2022. Councilwoman Hutzler stated that on behalf of herself and Recreation, they would like to thank the lifeguards and camp staff for their work this year. Councilwoman Hutzler stated that the Recreation department, herself and Council President Carra have been in discussions with the County Administrator regarding engineering services and assistance with grant applications for the possible splash park at Basilone Park. Councilwoman Hutzler announced that Recreation is currently looking into fall ball, and kickball is currently going on with 40 participants, they are also working on setting up the Trunk-or-Treat for Halloween as they did last year, as well as working on the Frosty Frolic 5K, which will take place on December 3, 2022, they are hoping to have registration information located on the Recreation website.

Councilwoman Hutzler reported that for the month of July 2022, Municipal Court had a total of 321 cases filed, total cases disposed was 254, with a total amount collected \$20,525.91, total amount to the Borough was \$9,547.59.

Mayor Bray – Mayor Bray stated that he had two things to share, the first was about Discovering Raritan, he personally thanked Carey Marago and her committee for their work in putting that event together, ever since its Inception in 2019, it continues to grow and evolve, adding that anyone who is interested in getting involved or bringing new ideas to the Discovering Raritan event or any other events, we certainly welcome your help there. Mayor Bray stated that the second thing he wanted to share was to thank and congratulate the Raritan Police Department, Bridgewater Police Department, Somerset County Sheriff's Department and the Assistant Prosecutor in their apprehension of the criminal last week that has been on the loose for over a year, hopefully that has put some people's minds at rest and some justice has finally been served that is long overdue, adding another thank you to all those who did a great job with that.

## **SECOND PUBLIC COMMENT**

*(In accordance with Section 29-1 of the Code of the Borough of Raritan, there shall be a five-minute limit per speaker)*

Mayor Bray opened Public Comment for any member of the Public wishing to be heard.

Madelene Magazino, 41 Alpine Way: Mrs. Magazino said that she is here tonight along with Hector and Jessica Ararat (40 Alpine Way), in regards to the access road from Alpine Way to the property owned by Mr. and Mrs. Seijas, adding that the Ararat's and herself have retained an attorney, who emailed a letter to Borough Clerk/Administrator Colvin earlier this afternoon and she would like to hand deliver a copy of said letter to Mayor and Council, adding that the reason everybody wanted to retain an attorney is because while they understand there is a historical aspect to the property and what goes with it, they also think there are land use laws that are in effect and they want to understand those laws better, which is why they retained an attorney. Mayor Bray instructed Mrs. Magazino to leave the letters with Borough Clerk/Administrator Colvin so Mayor and Council can look at them later on their own time.

INAUDIBLE NAME: The resident inquired about a possible update for the jughandle by the Washington School, stating that on March 14, 2018, there was an update that that the jughandle was going to be extended. The resident stated that she lives right off First Avenue and sometimes it takes her four traffic light cycles to get across 202, adding that people from the left lane continually cut people off in the right lane. Councilman Giraldi stated that he had a conversation with Borough Engineer Schrek yesterday, who stated he was told it would take about two years. Mayor Bray stated the Borough and County have been pushing for this to happen, but the delay is coming from the State level, adding that ultimately, the State will set the timeline and have the work performed.

Adam Armahizer, 41 Victoria Street: Mr. Armahizer stated that he just moved back to Raritan after serving with the Marines and would like to know off-hand how many new apartment complexes/buildings have gone up in the past five years. Mayor Bray responded with saying two. Mr. Armahizer then asked a follow up question of how much money has the Municipality received from these apartment complexes/developments, specifically block 81, the Raritan Crossings. Borough Clerk/Administrator Colvin responded by saying that Block 81 is still finalizing their audit but there is a minimum that the Borough will receive from the first year, which is \$200,000.00, minus 5 percent that goes to the County.

Joe DeVito, 17 Columbus Avenue: Mr. DeVito stated he wanted to follow up about the letter he got from the attorney, he stated that Mayor Bray said earlier that there was a grant and he wanted to know who would be assigned/working on the grant. Mayor Bray stated that our Borough Engineer Schrek would be working on that grant. Mr. DeVito inquired if Borough Engineer Schrek would be submitting the green and asked for a timeframe. Mayor Bray stated that to his understanding its open every calendar year and can be applied for each year, adding that it had just opened for applications, and it probably takes around 60 days after submission.

Mr. DeVito then asked if the easement mentioned in Block 96, Lot 5 was a vacant lot he had been talking about. Mayor Bray responded by saying no, the easement was for something Somerset Street. Mr. DeVito then inquired what is happening with the vacant lot, adding that Mayor and Council had stated that they were looking into various things to do with that lot, and he wanted to know if they talked to the owners and what the plan is. Borough Clerk/Administrator Colvin and Mayor Bray stated that the Borough Engineer Schrek would need to speak to that, Borough Attorney Robertson stepped in to add that our engineer was looking into the land there. Mr. DeVito then asked if the engineer report was ready for the public to view, to which Borough Attorney Robertson replied he would need to speak with Borough Engineer Schrek and Borough Clerk/Administrator Colvin.

Colleen Kempe, 114 Sherman: Mrs. Kempe stated that she likes the idea of the street cleaning, adding that she hears them all the time, but it doesn't need an ordinance or anything fancy. Mrs. Kempe stated that better communication is needed, adding to just let the people know what's going on, just giving a heads up that the street sweeper is coming by on whichever day and time. Mayor Bray stated that to the point made by Councilwoman Melitsky is that the past practices has just been them going out when they had time, but they would like to change that to more of a set schedule. Mrs. Kempe then stated that she likes the idea of the Frosty Frolic 5K but is also curious why there is a fee, adding that we charge a fee for baseball, which you get a jersey, there is a fee for kickball, why are they so interested in collecting money, stating that Recreation has a budget and that we don't need to make a profit, not

saying that we couldn't use it for other things like the pools, adding that the last meeting there was talk about having the pools open on the weekends but now she heard the pool is closing Friday. Mrs. Kempe stated that there is a lot of "we'll look into" talk but then nothing happens, adding that she is curious as to why the pool is closing on August 19. Councilwoman Hutzler replied by saying that the pool is being closed on August 19 because the lifeguards are going back to college. Mrs. Kempe asked if only four lifeguards were hired for the whole summer, adding that she never saw an ad posted and she feels that this was handled properly, and she would love to mention this at a Recreation meeting, but they take place at the same time as the Council Meetings. Mrs. Kempe stated that last meeting she was frustrated with the food pantry business, but she wanted to say that Borough Clerk/Administrator Colvin has been wonderful, and they worked everything out, adding that they have been getting their checks two to three weeks, which made the pantry very happy and thankful for that, and again she thanked Borough Clerk/Administrator Colvin for his help.

Neither seeing nor hearing any additional member of the Public, Mayor Bray closed Public Comment.
