PUBLIC COMMENT (AGENDA ITEMS ONLY)

(In accordance with Section 29-1 of the Code of the Borough of Raritan, there shall be a five-minute limit per speaker)

Mayor Carra opened the Public Comment portion of the meeting for members of the public wishing to speak.

Adrienne Schwall, 14 Obert Dr: Ms. Schwall asked if Council had given the Borough Attorney the ‘okay’ to file a lawsuit against NJ Transit. Borough Attorney Wenner responded, stating that they are still in the process of completing the research into viable claims the Borough can pursue. Once that is complete, the viable claims would then be presented to Council for their consideration of authorizing filing a suit. Ms. Schwall then stated that after reviewing the records she had requested from the Borough about how much money we pay NJ Transit for their parking lot which is \$55,000 a year and the income the Borough gets which she calculated to be about an average of \$17,000 a year; not a great deal it is made out to be. Administrator Colvin added that unfortunately, COVID did have a big effect on the use of the trains. Discussion ensued regarding the amount of money the Borough receives and if renting the lot is really a benefit for the Borough.

Ed Machala, 9 Barbieri Ct: Mr. Machala asked about Ordinance 2025-23 and if this will replace the previous version 2025-16, to which Mayor Carra confirmed. Mr. Machala then asked if this version was available and again Mayor Carra stated yes but added that it may be changed tonight as the Borough Engineer will be doing a presentation later during the meeting.

Victor Laggini, 250 Weiss Terr: Mr. Laggini asked if there was any update on the quiet zone to which Council President Tozzi stated that they are looking into putting up a multimillion-dollar berm. Mr. Laggini continued to state that the Senator's office was also looking into a berm project but he has not heard from his office in a number of weeks. He then added that he hopes the Borough will continue pursuing this and not allow it to be forgotten as it has in the past. Lastly, he stressed how important it is for the members of Council to keep the Borough's taxes stabilized as he is hearing rumors of an increase.

Jeff King, 47 Vones Ln: Mr. King stated that the Raritan Food Pantry opened back up last month and that it will be open twice a month; typically on a Saturday from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. It is located across from the Post Office on Somerset Street and the next distribution day will be December 13th. He then added a thank you to all those who have donated and added that they are always looking for more donations.

Bob Strauss, 56 Vones Ln: Mr. Strauss asked about the audio in the new Municipal Building and if it would be better than what is currently being used for Council meetings. Mayor Carra confirmed that the audio will be brand new and much better in the new building.

Roger Copt, 1120 Rt 202: Mr. Copt wanted to thank Councilman Agrawal and Mr. King for organizing the Food Bank; they did an excellent job making that happen in Raritan again. Next, he asked about the Agway property and asked if all the members of Council are able to speak on the matter without a conflict because they live within 200 feet of the property. Mr. Copt then stated that according to the Borough map, Council President Tozzi lives within 197 feet of the Agway property. Council President Tozzi stated that if he needs to recuse himself, he will without objection.

Neither seeing nor hearing any other member of the public, the Mayor closed Public Comment.

COMMITTEE & LIAISON REPORTS

Councilman Patente – Councilman Patente stated that at the last Senior meeting they had polish food for lunch with a great turnout of over 50members; adding that anyone who is of the age is encouraged to join. Their next meeting will be held at Stony Brook Grill in Branchburg for their Holiday Luncheon. The Councilman then stated that he was offended for what is listed on tonight's agenda and what is not listed. He continued to express his frustration with nothing relating to the Personnel Policy being listed after having previous discussions about it. He then proposed that the Borough authorize a hiring freeze, for any new full-time positions, to ensure the Borough's finances are in order and can support any new hires.

Councilman Agrawal stressed the importance of avoiding any potential conflicts of interest or the appearance of any impropriety when accepting donations from a business of resident that may have matters pending in front of Council or the Planning Board. Discussion amongst Council members ensued about the importance of transparency and tracking of any money donated to the Borough.

He stated that he agrees that something needs to be done with the downtown area but with proper discussions with the residents, business owners, and Council. He continued to express his frustrations with the lack of notice to those that may be affected and how fast this ordinance is being presented and expected to pass. Discussion ensued amongst Council members on if it is worth making the motion to table the Ordinance now verse waiting until the meeting gets to that agenda item as the Mayor mentioned a professional is in attendance tonight to make a presentation on the benefits to establishing a Special Improvement District.

Councilman Agrawal asked where the residents would go to get copies of any pending ordinances or resolutions to which the Mayor responded saying anyone interested can reach out to the Clerk's office for any copies of agenda items. Councilman Agrawal then asked why we don't make those more accessible to the public such as posting things to our website. Discussion

ensued on the process of an ordinance and what the best options are moving forward to fully notify the residents of Raritan of what is going on within the Borough so they can be a part of the discussion.

Councilman Patente stated that his last item to discuss is relating to the demolition over on La Grange Street. He continued to explain that the issue was discussed extensively on Facebook with pictures and videos of what was happening. The Councilman stated that he does not think the Borough has a good policy relating to demolition and that needs to change. He recommended the mayor set up a sub-committee on demolitions to have open communications when demolition is happening within the Borough. It was stated that there will be changes made for the upcoming year with many different committees to ensure the Borough and the residents are aware of what is happening around town.

Councilman Fritzinger – Councilman Fritzinger stated that bulk pick-up is over for the year and will pick back up in March of 2026. He then added that leaf pick-up is still on-going through December 15th. He then reported that the Historical and Cultural Committee met on November 19th, he was unable to make that meeting but Council President Tozzi attended and filled him in afterward. The Historical and Cultural Committee reported that their working budget is in the amount of \$1774.92 and the trust is in the amount of \$11,099.15. He then added that there are a few things coming up at the Raritan Public Library such as the arrest of Derek VonGotten by the Hessians on St. Nicolas Day, which is on the 12th and then there will be a lead up to the date of the Delaware Crossing on January 10th at one o'clock.

Council President Tozzi – Council President stated that there is a new coffee shop open over by Angelone's off of 202 called Forum Coffee; he encouraged anyone interested to check them out. He then added that there will be another new business opening in December located at the old Michael's Inn building called Usual Suspects. They re-did the entire building and are just awaiting a permit before they will be open. Lastly the Council President stated that the Christmas Tree lighting will be held on December 10th at 6 p.m. at the Nevius Street Bridge; students from JKF School will be singing Christmas Carols and invited everyone to join in the event.

Council DiGraziano – Councilman DiGraziano reported that Santa will be coming to Frelinghuysen Park on December 13th from 1-3 p.m. and invited anyone to come out and enjoy the event.

Councilman Agrawal – Councilman Agrawal stated that he wanted to make some comments prior to his report relating to the sewer bill ordinance. He stressed that the residents need to know what is going on and what the reasons are behind instituting a sewer fee. The Councilman continued to explain that the Borough is in financial trouble and how this fee will impact every household within the Borough. He suggested to table introducing Ordinance No. 2025-23 for sewer billing until Council and the residents fully understand how that will impact the residents; adding that a Town Hall meeting may be a beneficial option for an open discussion about this matter.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Mayor Carra opened the Public Comment portion of the meeting for members of the public wishing to speak.

Jim Werner, 407 Victoria St: Mr. Werner asked if the dumping fees included garbage and bulk tonnage, to which was confirmed. He then asked how the Borough intends to police bulk pick-up as everyone knows people from outside Raritan try to dump their stuff so it will be taken for free. Department of Public Works Director LoMedico responded explaining about the new sticker program the Borough will be rolling out in 2026 and that they will do their best to work with the residents to ensure that does not happen. Mr. Werner then asked if the signage for the visually impaired person could be revisited periodically as if the person who requested it is no longer in need of it, it can then be removed. Lastly, he asked about the electronic bikes and how that will be handled, to which the Mayor responded stating the Police will be enforcing the ordinance.

Angela Knowles, Professional Planner: Ms. Knowles wanted to announce to the residents that the Borough was awarded a Technical Assistance Grant that would help fund projects such as way finding signs, artwork, and benches among other things. She also added that the sustainable

economic plan previously approved by the Planning Board has incredible potential for this small but great Borough of Raritan.

Sam Tims, 1 LaGrange: Mr. Tims stated that a big pull for him to move to Raritan was Agway; he has a back yard garden that he would frequent Agway for supplies. He stressed to Council how important it is to notify your residents of potential projects. There should be more communication of the risks, budgetary restraints, potential drainage issues, and PILOT burdens being put onto the rest of the residents. He added that the developers should be involved in finding a solution that works for all parties.

Jill Brown, 18 Elmer St: Ms. Brown wanted to thank Councilman Patente for his earlier comment about LaGrange Street. She continued to express her utter frustration with the lack of involvement the Borough has with demolition projects. The environmental concerns as well as health concerns for the residents should be a top priority for the Borough. She stressed how important it is to have things change relating to demolition projects in the future.

Roger Copt, 1120 Rt 202: Mr. Copt stated that he thought tonight's meeting was quite the show. He expressed his frustration with the Borough Council making decisions without full information and stressed how important it is to do their job to protect the residents of this town.

Dilette Patente, 31 Glazer Ave: Ms. Patente stated that she was proud of Councilman Agrawal and Armahizer, along with her husband for telling the truth to the residents; stressing the importance of transparency.

Resident Jenni, no address given: Jenni stated that she appreciated the questions on behalf of the residents by Council members tonight. She agrees that any project proposed in Raritan should 'fit' in with the rest of the Borough. She continued to stress the importance of looking at how a project could impact the Borough; such as adding apartment will create more wear and tear on the sewer system. She continued by expressing her frustrations with the financial state of the Borough, adding her suggestions of where the Borough can easily save money.

Zack Bray, 61 Thompson St: Mr. Bray asked about recreation and that previously it was discussed about opening the Borough up to Bridgewater for them to open their programs up to Raritan residents and then they could have access to use the Borough's facilities. Councilman DiGraziano responded stating that he did meet with Mr. Pappas however, Bridgewater did not seem interested in merging or working with the Borough with the maintenance of our fields.

Mr. Pepe, Board of Education Representative: Mr. Pepe announced that fourth grade will be moving up to Isenhower, mixing Raritan students with Bridgewater students. He added an announcement about the High School play, the Outsiders, adults are \$12.00 and \$8.00 for seniors.

Michael DeCicco, 32 Alpine Way: Mr. DeCicco expressed how much he loves this town and the opportunity to speak. He hopes and encourages Council to maintain a balance and to make sure problems don't just fall onto the residents.

Neither seeing nor hearing any other member of the public, the Mayor closed Public Comment.
